





## Otto Koenigsberger: Building Bangalore in the 1940s

Otto Koenigsberger (1908–1999) was
Government Architect of the Princely Mysore
State from 1939 until 1948, when he was called
to Delhi by Jawaharlal Nehru to take on the
post of Director of Housing in the Ministry of
Health. Koenigsberger, a Berlin architect of
Jewish origin who had come to India to escape
persecution in Nazi Germany was, as
Government Architect, responsible for all the
architecture and town planning projects
undertaken by Mysore State.

Beginning at the Krishna Rao Park, this tour will introduce the participants to a wide range of Koenigsberger's architecture in Bangalore as well as to the architectural debates that marked the final period of colonial rule and the early years of independent nation building. Led by Dr. Rachel Lee, the tour will cover Koenigsberger's work under Dewan Mirza Ismail and follow his career from his involvement with the Mysore State to urban planning projects.



She is currently preparing a research project that investigates the history of East and West German development cooperation in sub-Saharan Africa. She is also involved in DARCH! – a project to establish an architectural heritage centre in Dar es Salaam which is currently underway.
